## Essential Transgender Terminology

Sex Assigned at Birth: the sex someone is assigned based on the appearance of the genitals at birth

AFAB: Assigned Female at Birth

AMAB: Assigned Male at Birth


Intersex: one's sex characteristics are not easily categorized as "female" or "male"



Being intersex is different than being transgender, and there are many intersex variations. Did you know being intersex is as common as having red hair?

Gender Identity: A person's internal understanding of their gender

Cisgender: Describes when someone identifies with the sex they were assigned at birth

Transgender: Describes when someone DOES NOT identify with the sex they were assigned at birth

Non-binary: Describes someone whose gender identity falls outside the categories of man/boy and woman/girl

Gender Expression: how a person outwardly expresses their gender through appearance, dress, and/or behavior.
